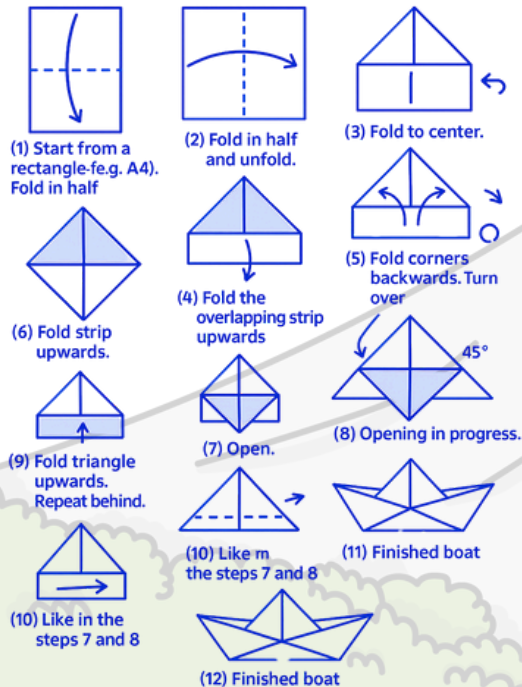

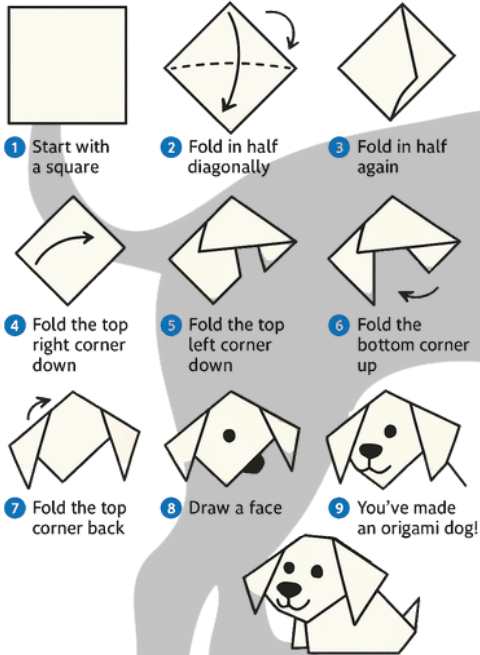
Boat for “Tangkuban Parahu”

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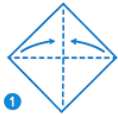
Dog for “Situmang”

HOW TO MAKE AN ORIGAMI BOAT



1 Start with a square piece of paper. Fold diagonally in both directions to form an X crease.



2 Fold the left and right flaps inward along the dotted line.



3 Fold the top owl-shaped flaps outward on both sides to form wings.



4 Fold the top layers outward on both sides to form wings.



5 Flip over the model. Cut a small slit at the tail end.



6 Fold the head down along the dotted line. Gently lift the beak upward.



7 Fold both sections of the tail outward.

Bird for “Manuk Cangkurileung”

Manuk Cangkurileung or Kutilang bird, which is widely known among the people of West Java, became even more popular when it was chosen as the logo for the 212th Anniversary of Bandung City. This bird was selected as it symbolizes the welcoming and friendly nature of the people of Bandung, who are known for being "someah" or hospitable. As one of Bandung's distinctive species, the Cangkurileung is a beloved fauna that reflects the region's charm.

In addition to its symbolic significance, the Cangkurileung bird is also known for its beneficial presence in agriculture. While it can be a nuisance to farmers by puncturing ripe papaya and banana fruits, it also plays an essential role in controlling pests, as it feeds on insects, worms, and small creatures that harm plants. This bird is also famous for its morning routines, such as sunbathing and dew bathing, which help maintain the oil on its feathers. Interestingly, Cangkurileung birds also raise their crests when happy or ready to relieve themselves. The Cangkurileung is featured prominently on the back wall of Hotel Indigo Bandung, celebrating the city's rich cultural heritage.
